OCTOBER Fun Facts About Halloween

1. Candy Corn's original name was Chicken Feed, which was created in 1880 by Wunderlee Candy Company employee George Renninger, Wunderlee was the first to sell the candy, followed by Goelitz Confectionery Company (now Jelly Belly Candy Co.) who has been producing the tri-colored candies since 1898. Candy Corn is one of the most popular Halloween candies with Americans purchasing over 20 million pounds each year.
2. 1.5 billion pounds of pumpkins are produced in the US each year. According to the US Department of Agriculture, the state of Illinois has more than 15,000 acres devoted to growing pumpkins, and the state produces up to five times more pumpkins than any other state.
3. The act of trick or treating has been around since medieval times. Known then as "guising," young people wore masks and full costumes and asked for food or money in exchange for poems, songs and other treats.
4. The origins of the phrase "trick or treat" are difficult to trace, but the custom had been established by the early 1950s when trick or treating was referenced in a Peanuts comic strip. In 1952, Disney produced a cartoon called "Trick or Treat" featuring Donald Duck and his nephew Huey, Dewey, and Louie.
5. The name "Jack-O-Lantern" first originated from an Irish folktale about a man named Stingy Jack who tricked the Devil over and over again. When Jack died, he was forced to walk the Earth with only a carved-out turnip and burning coal to help light his way. Pumpkins were easier to come by in the United States, so no more turnip carving.
6. According to the National Confectioners Association, chocolate candy is the most popular for Halloween, with 68% of people saying it's their favorite treat. About three-quarters of a trick-or-treaters bag is made up of chocolate.
7. Americans spend almost 10 billion dollars per year on Halloween. That's BILLION with a B. That's a lot of money to be spent on candy and costumes. Each consumer typically spends about \$80 dollars per year on their Halloween goodies.
8. Halloween is the second favorite holiday of the year. The first is of course Christmas.
9. Halloween has never been established as an official holiday.
10. While Halloween may be thought of as a day for kids to dress up, the holiday is more popular with adults. Today, over 70% of adults celebrate Halloween and spend just as much money on candy and costumes.

So, enjoy October, filled with bright purple and orange lights and scary décor. Have fun Trick or Treating at this year's Halloween celebration. It's one of Riverwalk's favorite parties.

FUN FACTS ABOUT THE MONTH OF OCTOBER

This month's name came from the Latin octo, "eight," because this was the eighth month of the early Roman calendar. When the Romans converted to a 12-month calendar, the name October stuck, even though it's now the 10th month!

The early Roman calendar, thought to have been introduced by Rome's first king, Romulus (around 753 b.c) was a **lunar** calendar. This ancient timekeeping system contained these 10 months: Martius, Aprilis, Maius, Iunius, Quintilis, Sextilis, September, October (the eighth month), November, and December. Martius, Maius, Quintilis, and October contained 31 days, while the other months had 30, for a total of 304 days. In winter, the days were not counted for two lunar cycles.

It wasn't until about 713 b.c. that a calendar reform, attributed to the second Roman king, Numa Pompilius, added the months Ianuarius and Februarius. Some historians think that both months were placed at the end of the year, while others believe that Ianuarius became the first month and Februarius the last. Later reforms organized the months as they are arranged today in the Gregorian calendar, whereby October became the 10th month in spite of its name.

October's birth flowers are the cosmos and the calendula or marigold. Cosmos is a symbol of joy in life and love and of peace. The calendula (aka garden, English, or pot marigold) represents winning grace, grief, or chagrin in the language of flowers.

The October birthstone is the **opal**, which symbolizes faithfulness and confidence.

- Gem-quality opals are known for their play of color, caused by the diffraction of light. They are available in several types, including black, fire, and white opals. Common opals do not shimmer.
- Opals symbolize hope and purity and were once thought to improve eyesight or enhance intuition. Throughout history, the gem's reputation has oscillated between standing for luck and standing for lack of luck. According to some, those born in October are immune from any possible negative effects.



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We have taken steps to limit exposure to the virus by making our customers aware that there is no need to have any contact with our employees if you choose to do so. Our business falls under the state's guidelines as "Essential Business".

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How the Board Works

I am writing this article for the many new residents in the community to hopefully educate on understanding what our Cooperative (Co-Op) is and how it relates to all residents and the Social Club. The Park is owned by the Co-Op which sells shares for each lot. When a share is bought, it is attached to the residency and the owner becomes a Shareholder. Once a share is attached to a home, it stays attached to that residency for all future owners. Any home that does not include a share, one can be purchased at any time.

Board members are elected to run the Co-Op on behalf of its members. These members are the Shareholders and as such are part owners of the park. The Board appoints someone to manage the Co-Op, which currently is Gateway Management. In addition, the Board is responsible for the direction of the Co-Op and complying with ethical and legal standards. The Co-Op is under state statutes 719 and 723.

Board meetings are held for the business of the board and the agenda is set by the board. Only shareholders can attend. Only agenda topics can be discussed. Any shareholder can request an item be added to the agenda by filling out a form, forms are available on the website.

In order for everyone in the community to give feedback on any subject the Manager meetings were put in place. The Manager's meeting is run by the Office Manager (CAM). The CAM is hired through Gateway and reports to the Board. The CAM is responsible for running the office and enforcement of the Rules and Regulations for the community. The CAM will report on any changes or updates for the community. Then it is an open forum for any questions. All residents can attend these meetings.

The Social Club is its own organization with its own state guidelines. The Co-Op Board and the Social Club board are two completely separate entities. One is not dependent on the other, they are separate.

Anyone who lives in the community can run for the Social Club board. The Social Club rents the club house from the Co-Op. They are charged \$1.00 for the year. All events that are run in the club house must be scheduled through the Manager.

This change was made about 6 years ago when we were reviewing our documents with the lawyer. He asked me who owns the club house. Then asked why an outside entity would be doing the scheduling for a club house that the Co-Op owned. This was when the above changes were made.

The Board is a resident just like anyone else as a member of the Social Club. They have nothing to do with the running of the Social Club. They can attend events or meetings or choose not to, just like any other resident.

Although the two groups are separate entities, the Social Club has made requests of the Board in the past. The most recent was replacing the grill. The Board has helped on some things, but it is not a requirement.

I hope this helps with understanding how the Board works.

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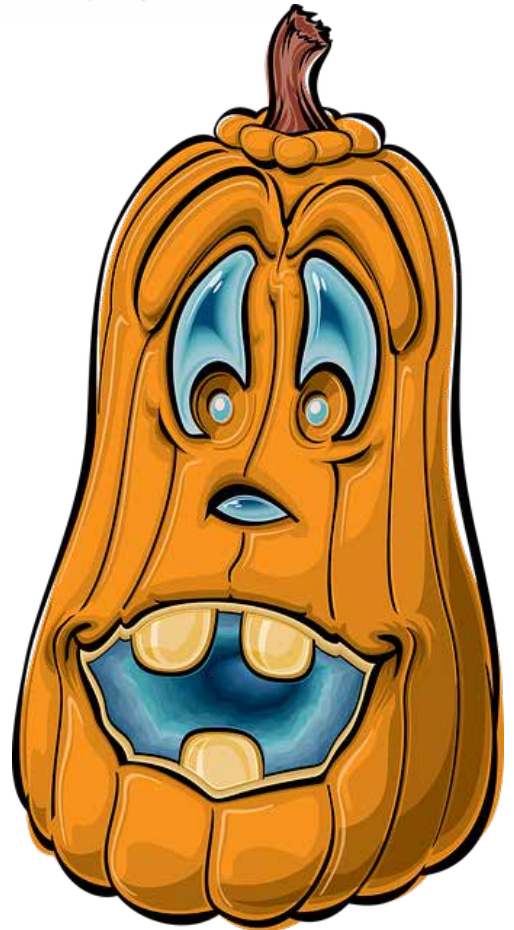
